

### LENT/EASTER 2016

#### From the Rector



Dear Friends,

Have you experienced grace? Has there been a dark time in your life -- perhaps a time of illness or loss, or estrangement from God or from a loved one, or the realization that you have royally messed up -- when you suddenly know that it is going to be alright? That you are accepted and cared for as you are? And where you can accept yourself as well?

**"You are Accepted."** This is the title of a famous sermon by the 20<sup>th</sup> century theologian, Paul Tillich. He was preaching on Romans 5:20 that contains the phrase, "But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound."

Tillich realized that most Christians find the words "sin" and "grace" rather mysterious, even strange, just because they are so well-known. So he provides other words to help us understand these terms: "Sin" means "separation" and "grace" means that moment when we know that "we are accepted" by the "Ground of Being" (Tillich's expression for God). He reminds us that the word "sin" should never be used in the plural – it does not pertain to immoral acts; it is instead a state of being that every human being experiences. Indeed, Tillich says that it is arrogant and erroneous to divide people by calling some "sinners" and some "righteous." Looking at the Gospels, I would say that Jesus would agree with him! Tillich preached:

"...the state of our whole life is estrangement from others and ourselves, because we are estranged from the Ground of our Being, because we are estranged from the origin and aim of our life. We are separated from the mystery, the depth, and the greatness of our existence. We hear the voice of that depth; but our ears are closed. We feel that something radical, total, and unconditioned is demanded of us; but we rebel against it, try to escape its urgency, and will not accept its promise."

However, although we can be estranged from God, we are always bound to God as well. God will not let us go, and we cannot wholly let go of God. Something will give! "Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound." Like Paul struck on the road to Damascus, grace most often strikes us when we are in great pain, restlessness or unhappiness. It strikes us when we're walking through the dark valley. However, it can also strike us at virtually any time in our lives when we are vulnerable and open, when we have an experience of awe or wonder. Suddenly we feel God's presence, God's grace, whether as a strike of lightning or, more likely, as a feeling of warmth spreading into our hearts, and we know that "we are accepted" – "we are loved just as we are."

On the First Sunday in Lent, I mentioned a magnet I had seen on a refrigerator at our Episcopal convent in Mendham. It said: "What is life? It's an opportunity to grow a soul." This is a concise description of the movement of sin and grace in our lives. Life is often an experience of separation – but grace is always waiting for a chance to break into our separation from God, ourselves, our neighbors, our world. Grace lets us know that we are accepted, like a newborn baby that doesn't have to do anything to justify its welcome. And then our souls can grow, like tender shoots responding to the warm sun and gentle rain of springtime, as we reconnect to the Ground of our Being and to our truest selves, and freed up for love and service.

Perhaps Lent, with its emphasis on repentance, renewal and spiritual growth, is a good time to reclaim the Gospel words of "sin" and "grace," and to make them our own.







Judy was a very special lady. Atonement has lost a devoted friend whose presence will be missed, and we will always hold wonderful memories of her in our hearts.



Belcanto give regular concerts and raise funds for a number of charities and churches in the Kettering district of the United Kingdom. They are winners of the First Prize for female choirs at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod in 2015 and 2012.
